MONUMENTAL STAIRCASE & FACADE Restoration Project Overview



Stambaugh Auditorium

The Henry H. Stambaugh Auditorium is a non-profit public auditorium which opened in 1926 through the generous bequest of Youngstown area businessman and philanthropist, Henry H. Stambaugh. The centerpiece of the complex is the Concert Hall which has a seating capacity of 2,553 and is renowned for its near-perfect acoustics. The Concert Hall also features the E. M. Skinner Pipe Organ Opus 582. The Henry H. Stambaugh Auditorium was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1984.

The Auditorium also features a 9,000-square-foot ballroom (The Jeanne D. Tyler Grand Ballroom), a recital hall (The Anne Kilcawley Christman Memorial Hall), a formal garden at the southern end of the building, along with two (2) lobbies. All spaces can be rented for public, business, or private functions. The venue welcomes national and international performers on a regular basis while also hosting local and regional entertainment events.

The board of directors and management team at Stambaugh Auditorium are proud to advocate for and work towards this vital restoration project. This celebratory venue is irreplaceable and must always remain an important contributor to the cultural and historic fabric of our great community. PROJECT OVERVIEW

The goal of this project is to raze and replace the 5th Avenue Monumental Staircase and platform, re-construct retaining walls, add dimensional exterior lighting to the West, South and East Entrances and Facades, clean the decades of soot from the exterior of these facades, and restore all decorative metalwork at the entranceway. All of this work will be done using historically guided materials. This is to ensure the integrity of the construction for many years to come and to preserve the building to the standards set forth by the Historic Preservation Office of Ohio and the National Register of Historic Places through the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Over the past 94 years, harsh winters, salt treatment, rain, sleet and sun have caused the iconic staircase to reach its structural maturity. The broken and crumbling steps were a safety hazard necessitating that the monumental staircase and grand entrance be closed until repairs could be made. According to the initial surveying and core drillings, the main staircase structure is within five years of the end of its life. Those core drillings were conducted in November of 2017. The conclusive results of the surveying and drillings indicated the need to chip away the loose stone and replace it with fresh concrete patch as a temporary fix. This process was completed and Stambaugh Auditorium management was assured that this temporary fix would allow the staircase to remain functional over the course of the immediate future but would not preserve the life of the structure.

The 5th Avenue staircase is not only the main entrance of Stambaugh Auditorium, but it also has been recognized, by the Youngstown and surrounding community, as a cultural and historic landmark. Replacement of the 5th Avenue Staircase is crucial to Stambaugh Auditorium because it not only contributes to the architectural detail of the building but also the financial success of our organization.


The capital campaign began in 2018 and will continue through project completion.
